Transcript 1

Work Experience: 35 months

WAT Topic: College degree is overhyped in the Indian education system

Interview Panel: 2 Panelists (Both Male)

P1: You were the last candidate on the list. What were you thinking outside?

Ans: I said I was thinking about my hometown (because I was expecting current affairs-related questions on Dhanbad and Jharkhand).

P1: Type of coal mines? You must have seen in your district.

Ans: I said 2 types - open mines and closed mines, then defined both of them.

P1: Are you sure?

Ans: Yes sir, based on my knowledge.

P1: What's your company doing and your role in this?

Ans: Explained briefly about the company and my role.

Then some counter questions about why we are doing this, elaboration with examples, and explanations of the terminology used.

P1: How long have you been there in this company?

Ans: From the last 6 months. Earlier, I was in the construction sector.

P1: Tell me about the construction of the Howrah Bridge. (Further explained: I want to know the type of beam.)

Ans: I got confused, then replied that it could be a combination of two cantilever beams from both ends fixed, or it could be an overhanging beam.

P1: Draw the diagram and explain why?

Ans: I drew on the paper and then said it is an overhanging bridge and explained why. (After a Google search, I found out it is a suspension-type balanced cantilever bridge.)

P1: How will you identify the defects inside the metal body?

Ans: I started answering that we can check the strength of the material. If the values lie within the standard range, then it's defect-free. Similarly, for other methods, we can perform tests like ultrasonic wave testing and...

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P1: (Interrupted in the middle and explained the 2 methods: destructive and non-destructive tests with examples.)

P2: Your CGPA is very close to 8 in every semester. What does that mean? Are you stagnant or consistent?

Ans: I said it shows my consistency over the years while participating in other extracurricular activities.

P2: Write on the paper - "I am eager to learn."

Ans: I wrote the sentence.

P2: Then why have you written "I m eager to learn" in SOP?

Ans: Sorry sir, it could be a typo. (Later, I realized it was "I'm." Due to the print quality, it was illegible.)

P2: Okay, one last question. What would you prefer in case of a dilemma—your ethics or your morality?

Ans: I answered in favor of my ethics and gave a reason, but it wasn't structured well. I kept making the same point repeatedly.

Then both panelists said, "Okay, you can take some toffee and enjoy the rest of the day."

Transcript 2

Background: Non-Engineer **Graduation:** Life Sciences

Panel: 1 Male [M] & 1 Female [F] (Both in their 50s)

M- So, why do you want to do an MBA and specifically from IIM-Lucknow?

I gave my answer, and it appeared that they were satisfied.

M- So, you have done your graduation in life sciences. Tell us about your subjects.

Named all of them.

M- Explain the medical diagnostics subject you mentioned.

Explained intricacies about it.

M- So, what are the various types of blood groups, and what makes them different?

Answered.

F- What is the total number of leukocytes in the human body?

As I didn't know the accurate figure, I asked if I could make an educated guess.

F- What about 15000 leukocytes?

No, Ma'am, it is much below the actual figure. (Looked a little satisfied)



M- Why did you leave UPSC? Have your attempts been exhausted?

I answered NO and stated my purpose for leaving UPSC preparation.

M- What did you want to become after UPSC?

Answered.

M- Your father was in Delhi Police. What is his current position in the department?

Answered and explained more or less all aspects of my father's profession.

M- Is it possible for two different types of roses to be present on one stem?

Answered that I had never seen such a thing. When they asked me to take a stand, I said, "I don't think so, Sir."

M- It is possible. Many gardeners use this technique. Where have you seen a wide variety of plants?

Answered that during my childhood in Mughal Garden (Now, Amrit Udyan).

M- So, can potatoes and tomatoes be grown on the same plant?

I confidently answered that it is not possible as one is a shoot crop and the other is a root crop.

M- So, 10 people were present in this room with you during WAT. How many of them wore spectacles?

As I didn't know the exact number, I guessed 4 or 5.

M- So, how many of them were wearing a tie?

The female panelist stopped the male panelist, and both giggled a little.

M- So, we have observed that Quant is not significantly present in your background. In an MBA, you will have to handle a lot of math. How will you deal with it?

I explained my preparation for Quant in UPSC (CSAT) and CAT and assured them I would bridge any remaining gaps.

M- Okay, so tell me, how will you calculate the volume of this room?

Sir, this room is a cuboid, so volume will be calculated as Length × Breadth × Height.

M- So, what is the height of this room?

Sir, maybe 4 to 5 meters.

M- 4-5 meters! No, Priyanshu, that is too much.

Sorry Sir, but I thought this range was correct.

M- No, it is not. STAND UP. Now, measure the height of this room.

Sir, my height is 6 feet. (Stopped by M)

M- So, what is the height of this room in meters?

(I didn't know the feet-to-meter conversion.) Sorry Sir, but I don't know this conversion.

M- Strange, you don't know the conversion?

(Then, I suddenly remembered an actor's height from Wikipedia, which was 6 feet or 1.2 meters.) I said,



"Sir, I think my height is 1.2 meters."

M- You said you didn't know the conversion. Now you are giving a figure.

I explained how I recalled it from Wikipedia. (They both laughed.) Ma'am then said, "Priyanshu, your height is 1.8 meters."

So, I calculated $1.8 \times 2 = 3.6$ meters as the room's height. They looked satisfied and laughed again.

M- Wow, in Amritsar, you would have said Amritsar. In Rohtak, you would have said Rohtak. Isn't it?

No Sir, this is not the case. In my Rohtak PI, this question was not asked. In my Amritsar PI, I told them about Lucknow only. (Now, they looked a little satisfied.)

Location: Bangalore

WAT (15 min) - How much more wait for ESG implementation?

(Our panel did not explain what ESG meant, but some panels did explain the middle of the WAT Session)

Panel- 1, 2M (both 30-40)

10th - 10CGPA **12th -** 95.4%

Graduation - 7.46CGPA (B.Tech)

Work Experience - 4 years 7 months

P1- Explain to us your emotional journey from the moment the WAT topic was revealed, to when you finally realised the meaning & started writing to now, since your WAT seems appropriate for the topic. **Me-** Explained the emotional turmoil, then the realisation and how just wanted to just write something meaningful and not completely off the topic.

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- **P2:** {Was having a look at all my certificates.}
- P1- What was your specialization in your graduation?
- Me- Told him it was Metallurgical and Materials Engineering.
- P1- What is Corrosion?
- **Me-** Explained to him in simpler terms.
- **P1-** Not in simple terms.
- **Me-** Told him I didn't remember the definition as it had been 4 years (joked about how I can remember counting when it was taught much before) and went on to explain it with examples.
- P1- Can it be cured?
- **Me-** Explained that it can be prevented but cure is tough as a layer needs to be sacrificed, continued with the explain of Statue of Liberty and why curing it is not possible.
- P1- You are doing fairly well for yourself, why do you want to do an MBA?
- Me- Gave the prepared answer about gaining cross-functional business exposure.
- **P1-** Well nobody knows anything even in IIML, like you did so well in your college but don't remember anything it's the same, they just get placed that's it. Then why? Also, you can apply for 1 year course why waste 2 years?
- **Me-** Tried to defend why business education is necessary. Then explained I would be eligible for a 1-year course next year and also explained that I want the college experience hence more interested in this course.
- **P2:** {Pointing out I hadn't done well in differential equations and economics in my graduation, the 2 subjects that are needed in MBA}
- **P1-** The emotional reason makes more sense, had you given that as your first reason I would have better accepted.
- **Me-** Explained why that is not my first reason, cause it a big decision to do an MBA considering the amount of time and money I needed to invest. Coming from a middle-class family we spend very frugally, also didn't want to burden my family with a large loan etc.
- **P1-** But isn't planning to save and then apply a big gamble when student loans are so easily available? **Me-** Explained that is not the case, didn't get calls from college I liked earlier hence am waiting till now. Also, told him that this is my first call from IIML, had expected in the past and called the office to enquire as well but was not selected due to the normalisation of 12th marks.
- P1- You must have calls from other IIMs, what is your order of priority?
- **Me-** Told him I haven't decided, could be lucky to convert any and will decide afterwards because it is not just the general perspective that governs an individual's choices. Gave an example of how IIMK has a better NIRF rank than IIML, but I'd prefer IIML cause uncle lives nearby and can help me if required.
- **P2-** Is the general perspective close to the ranking of institutes?
- **Me-** Explained that yes it is, because most people look at the average package and curriculum to decide a college but I also look into other personal reasons. Gave them an example of how I chose a



lower-ranked college for graduation cause it was nearer to my hometown.

P2: {Tried convincing me to reveal a priority order of my calls}

P1- So if you get selected in IIMI, then later IIML and then IIMB. Would you stick to IIMI?

Me- I don't want to be a liar here and say yes. But, I definitely haven't thought of a proper order yet.

P1- That's all from our end.

P2: {Handed back my files and asked me if I had any questions for them}

Me- Asked a basic question about how hectic the curriculum is and if a semester abroad is allowed.

P1- Told me that the curriculum was slightly heavier due to more hours of classes, but it's manageable and semester abroad is allowed.

Overall the panelists were nice and helped me ease out. The questions though aimed at grilling me, were asked in a jovial manner and the interview seemed very lighthearted. Though, I am not sure as to how I performed because of the weirdness of the interview.

P1: Tell me about yourself.

Me: Told

P1: You used acronyms - SEO/SMM. What do they mean?

Me: Told the full form and explained the basics of it with an example

P1: What is a conglomerate? (Mentioned in TMAY)

Me: Company which is present in several industries. Gave example of Mahindra Group for which I work

P1: So L&T is a group or a conglomerate?

Me: I think it is better to call it a conglomerate as it is present in several domains like finance, IT, and construction.

P1: All groups are conglomerates, but all conglomerates are not groups. What do you say about that?

Me: Thought a bit. Said that all conglomerates will be groups, but not all groups can have the necessary amount of diversification to be called a conglomerate.

P1: What is your opinion on the impact of GST in logistics?

P1: That's all good. But in terms of economic benefits, like movement of goods, inventory movement, how is it impacting?

Me: Before GST, there was more prevalence of unaccounted and flawed paperwork. Unbilled movement was higher. Then gave an example of how not billing things helped in selling items for cheaper because of not having to pay taxes, giving an example of one of my friend's glass business. Said that it was cheaper for him to sell without GST.

P1: What is the transport rate in India? How much distance does a truck cover every day?

Me: Around 300 km per day.

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P1: So initially it was 200 km, but now it is 300 km. That's a 50% increase and that is great, think about that. Ok, talk about a recent news about transportation.

Me: I haven't heard, sir.

P1: There was a huge shipment of wheat between two cities. Can you tell me about the river and cities?

Me: Sir, I am not aware, but I will make an educated guess. Considering that the shipment was big, it would have been Waterway 1, using the Ganga River. Eastern states do not produce wheat, so it must have come from an upstream state. I will say it was from Uttar Pradesh to West Bengal.

P1: You almost got there. It's from the neighboring states, Bihar and Assam. Look it up.

Me: Sure, I will.

(Over to P2)

P2: What was taught in your course?

Me: Told

P2: What is a balanced transportation?

Me: Answered correctly.

M1 exchanged a long look with M2.

M1: What is a better measure of risk—Standard Deviation or Coefficient of Variation?

Me: Explained and answered.

M2: Do you know about Binary Variables?

Me: Had never heard the term.

M1 and M2 seemed shocked. M1 explained with an example.



M2: What is a Dummy Variable?

Me: Said it is used in mathematical equations.

M1: (Interrupts) No, it is used in statistical equations. Anyway, what is regression?

Me: Mentioned that statistics was not part of my undergraduate curriculum, so I wasn't familiar with these concepts.

M1: You come from a top UG college and expect me to believe they do not teach statistics in finance?

Me: Explained that basic math was used but not statistics in such detail.

M1: (Did not believe me) Show me your graduation marksheet.
